

GOOD FAITH ESTIMATES

Per Federal law, healthcare providers are required to give patients who, don't have medical insurance or who are not using medical insurance, an estimate of their out-of-pocket costs for upcoming medical services.

• You have the right to receive a Good Faith Estimate for the total expected cost of any non-emergent items or

services. These may include related costs such as imaging or laboratory fees, prescription drugs, durable medical equipment (DME) and hospital facility fees.

• Ensure that your healthcare provider provides a Good Faith Estimate in writing at least one (1) business day prior

to receiving your medical service. You may also ask your healthcare provider for a Good Faith Estimate prior to scheduling your medical service.

- If you receive a bill that is greater than \$400 more than your Good Faith Estimate, you may dispute your bill.
- It is advisable that you save a copy of the Good Faith Estimate that you receive for your records.
